# **SCAM ALERT**

Don't be fooled! Your co-op never makes calls demanding payments or threatens to disconnect service.

ast Central Electric is warning members about scams being perpetrated on utility consumers.

Scams on rate payers are increasingly common across the U.S. The scams usually begin with a telephone call that warns you that your account balance is overdue and your service is scheduled for immediate cut off.

The consumer is instructed to provide payment by purchasing a money card from a local store, and then giving that card number to the caller. Some scammers ask for the victim's credit card information.

In more sophisticated scams, callers are able to "spoof" the actual utility number so the call appears on Caller I.D. as the victim's legitimate utility. Some scammers leave messages asking the consumer to call them back. If the consumer calls that number, the automated answering system sounds very much like the consumer's utility, however, any option the consumer chooses delivers them to a real person who tries to get a payment.

Members are reminded that ECE *never* attempts to collect money over the telephone. Delinquent accounts receive notices in the mail.

If you receive a call or message about your ECE account, hang up the phone and refer to your last bill. Do not call any telephone numbers or visit any websites instructed by the caller until you check that information carefully against your ECE billing statement.

# What's Burning a Hole in Your Home **Energy Budget?**

Finding out what uses the most is starting point for savings.

ost co-op members would like to be more energy efficient and save money, but where do you start? To begin, it's useful to know what's consuming the most energy in your home.

Together, home heating and cooling take the biggest bite out of your energy budget. On the bright side, you can achieve at least 10 percent savings by taking a few simple low-cost steps.

- During cold weather, set your thermostat to 68°F. In the summer, leave it at 78°F.
- Clean the filters and coils of your HVAC system.
- Caulk and weather-strip around windows and doors.

Take a fresh look at the lighting in your home. Replacing your home's five most frequently used bulbs with Energy Starcertified LEDs could save you \$75 per year. heater with an insulating blanket. This is even more important if you have an older unit. For additional savings, insulate exposed hot water lines and drain one to two gallons of water from the bottom of your tank annually to prevent sediment build-up.

If your refrigerator was purchased before 2001, chances are it uses 40 percent more energy than a new Energy Star model. New Energy Star refrigerators use at least 15 percent less energy than non-qualified models and 20 percent less energy than required by current federal standards.

Making even a few of these changes should net you a savings on your monthly bill. Why not give it a try?


Has your status changed? "I Now Pronounce You...

East Central Electric needs upto-date, accurate information in order to properly apply your capital credits. Accurate records also make it easier for you to conduct business with your co-op. Federal legislation enacted after September 11, 2001 prevents us from discussing any account with anyone not listed on it.

If you are recently widowed, you need to update your membership application so your account can be placed in your name. ECE cannot hold an account in the name of a deceased person. Other members who have lost loved ones who live on co-op lines are asked to contact the co-op so we can make the necessary changes.

# **Celebrating With Heart-Shaped Balloons?**

Please do it indoors!

f you're lucky enough to be in love this Valentine's Day, shout it from the rooftops; take out a full-page ad in the local newspaper; and post it on Facebook. But whatever you do, don't show your love by releasing a bunch of heart-shaped balloons into the sky.

Runaway balloons—especially those with metallic content—too often come into contact with overhead power lines. When they do, they can cause a temporary power outage. In fact, hundreds of thousands of homes and businesses lose their power every year when helium-filled foil balloons drift into power lines.

The balloon's metallic coating can conduct electricity. So when the balloon touches a wire, it can start a fire or create an electrical surge. Either way, power in your area will go out, home electronics are at risk and East Central Electric's property is damaged.

If you must take balloons outdoors, secure them with weights so they won't get loose. And don't bring them near overhead power lines or deliberately set them free to float through the sky.

If a balloon does get stuck in a power line, do not try to retrieve it yourself! Instead, call your electric cooperative and report it at 918-756-0833.

# Mocha Dark Chocolate Brownies

### **INGREDIENTS**

Cooking spray

1 cup sugar

½ cup unsweetened cocoa

3 T. butter, melted

11/2 T. instant coffee granules

2 T. water

1 tsp. vanilla extract

½ tsp. baking powder

1 large egg, lightly beaten

1 large egg white, lightly beaten

3/3 cup all-purpose flour

½ (3-oz.) bar dark chocolate, chopped (such as Ghirardelli)



Preheat oven to 350°F.

Coat bottom of an 8-inch square baking pan with cooking spray.

Combine sugar and next eight ingredients in a bowl.

Lightly spoon flour into dry measuring cups; level with a knife. Add flour and dark chocolate to cocoa mixture, stirring just until blended. Spread batter in prepared pan. Bake at 350°F. for 30 minutes. Cool on a wire rack. Yield: 16 brownies.
